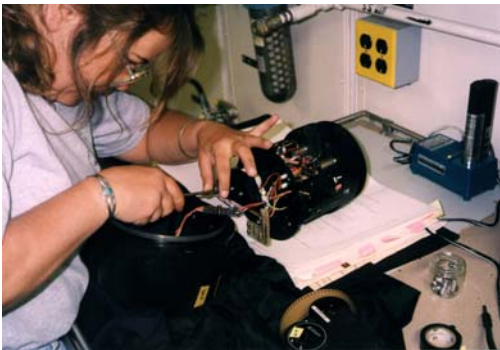

Guidelines for digital photos:

- 1) If possible, set the camera for 300 dpi resolution (or higher).
- 2) If sent to MATE electronically, please save the photos as tif files; if given to MATE on a disk, jpegs will work.
