

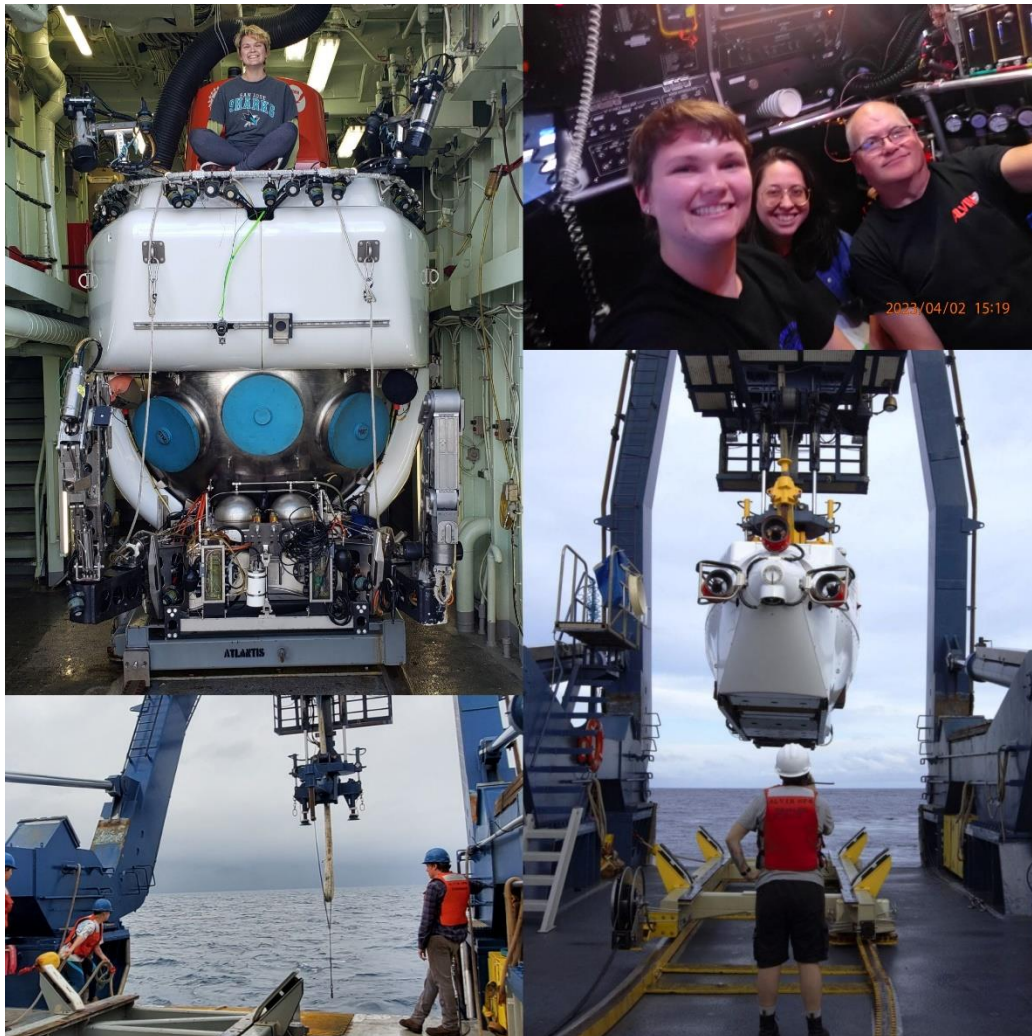
Kaitlyn Beardshear former MATE intern 2020

Entering my last year of college, I wasn't sure what I wanted to do for a career. One of my professors recommended I check out the MATE program and their robotics competitions. Interested, I became a mentor to a middle school robotics group, helped them build an ROV, and later became a judge at the ROV competition.
